Secretariat of the Medical Council of Hong Kong

The secretariat of the Medical Council of Hong Kong (MCHK) is supported by staff of the Department of Health. They provide executive support to the Council, its committees and sub-committees in handling matters relating to the arrangement and conduct of meetings, registration of doctors, complaints concerning the professional conduct of doctors, disciplinary inquiries, licensing examination and other related work.

Note: Not all staff are fully deployed to the MCHK Secretariat. For the personnel establishment in 2015/16, six (i.e. two Senior Executive Officers, two Executive Officers I, one Clerical Officer and one Assistant Clerical Officer) out of the 16 staff are fully deployed to support the MCHK Secretariat. The remaining staff also support the secretariat of other statutory healthcare boards and councils.

Strengthening the Manpower Support of the Secretariat

The Government has provided additional funding for MCHK to employ six additional staff at various ranks to strengthen the manpower support of its Secretariat. The Secretariat has kick-started the relevant recruitment process with a view to identifying suitable incumbents to facilitate MCHK to expedite its complaint handling process at the earliest instance.

[®] The operating cost covers costs arising from the daily operation of MCHK, registration of doctors, complaints handling, conduct of inquiries and disciplinary proceedings, arrangement of the licensing examination and other related work. The operating cost has not yet included the legal expenses arising from the provision of legal services by the Department of Justice (DoJ). The average annual cost incurred by DoJ for supporting the preliminary investigation and inquiries of MCHK in the past five years was about \$8.5million.

Additional Funding

The Government has provided an additional funding of \$6.2 million to MCHK to increase manpower support (about \$5.10 million) of its Secretariat and to provide honorarium to experts (about \$1.10 million) at the preliminary investigation stage of MCHK, with a view to facilitating its complaint handling process through administrative measures under the current legislative limitation as far as practicable.

^{*} From 2014 onwards, the number of sitting of the licensing examination has been increased from one to two per annum. The costs related to arranging the licensing examination vary with the number of candidates.

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¹ The Architects Registration Board includes one member appointed by the Chief Executive (CE). The relevant Ordinance does not specify the appointed person shall be a practitioner or a lay person.

² The Engineers Registration Ordinance, Cap. 409, stipulates that The Engineers Registration Board shall consist of (a) not less than 20 members appointed by the Council of The Hong Kong Institution of Engineers and, (b) may include one member appointed by CE. The total number of Board members depends on the number of members appointed by the Council.

³ The Engineers Registration Board includes one member appointed by CE. The relevant Ordinance does not specify the appointed person shall be a practitioner or a lay person.

⁴ The Social Workers Registration Ordinance stipulates that the Social Workers Registration Board shall consist of 15 members, (a) eight among them are elected by registered social workers, (b) six among them are appointed by CE out of which at least three are non-social workers nor public officer, and (c) the other one is the Director of Social Welfare or his/her representative. The ratio of lay participation depends on the number of social workers appointed by CE.

III. Processing of Applications for Restoration of Name into the General Register by MCHK

Time Required for Processing of Restoration Applications

For the period from 2013 to 2015, MCHK received and handled 71 restoration applications. Majority of the restoration applications were processed within one month with details as follows:

(a) 87% (one month)

- names have been removed from the General Register due to the failure to obtain practising certificate or retention certificate before 30 June
- in general, there is no need for MCHK to conduct restoration inquiry to handle these applications

(b) 9% (16 days to 4.5 months)

- names removed from the General Register pursuant to a disciplinary order
- during the enquiry, MCHK might impose conditions on the restoration of names for these doctors. MCHK would take into account such conditions in considering whether the applicants were fit and proper to be restored to the General Register, or to impose conditions on their registration to the General Register
- If considered necessary, MCHK would request the applicants to take appropriate measures (such as completion of continuing medical education) and provide evidence to prove that they were fit and proper to practise

(c) 4% (others)

- applicants who had outstanding or new complaint cases or new conviction cases when they applied for restoration of names to the General Register
- MCHK could only process these applications after rulings by court or completion of investigation reports by relevant enforcement authorities
- MCHK would conduct restoration inquiry to consider whether these applicants were fit and proper to be restored to the General Register, or to impose conditions on their registration to the General Register

Latest Administrative Arrangement

In 2015, a total of 13 restoration hearings could not be processed as a result of insufficient quorum. MCHK has already implemented new measures by arranging the restoration hearings to be held immediately after the monthly Policy Meeting of MCHK in order to ensure sufficient quorum for conducting restoration hearings.
